Goal

The purpose of the Southern Regional Meeting is to foster research among senior and young investigators and provide a forum in which this research can be successfully submitted, discussed, debated, and improved upon with respectful interactions between both peers and mentors. The Southern Regional Meeting brings together researchers, clinicians, and students to review the current research and its impact on the future of clinical investigation and medical care.

Educational Objectives

MANUSCRIPT PREPARATION AND PEER-REVIEWED PUBLICATION

This workshop will address multiple aspects of publication in scientific journals. Presenter will discuss preparation of materials, including the initial decision that the data are sufficient to justify publication. Issues related to manuscript writing will include length, focus, adherence to journal formats, and referencing. The editorial process from submission to publication will be described in-depth with particular attention to ways in which authors can interact with journal editors. Another section will cover ethical issues in publication including review boards, authorship, duplicate publication, intellectual property rights, and conflict of interest. There will be open discussion of sample cases and questions derived from the experiences of the participants.

THE PEDIATRICIAN'S ROLE IN PUBLIC HEALTH: IMPROVING HEALTH OUTCOMES IN COMMUNITIES.

Workshop Leaders: Kimberly E. Stone, *UT Southwestern Medical School*

The changing landscape of health care is emphasizing population health and public health outcomes, even in clinical practice. Hospitals are focusing on community health as a means to decrease Emergency Department utilization and prevent readmissions. Socioeconomic determinants of health, adverse child experiences, mental health challenges and substance use disorders have far-reaching impacts on the health and well-being of America's children. Natural disasters, disease outbreaks, the threat of bio-terrorism and school shootings require preparation and collaboration not discussed in depth during medical school and residency. In January 2018, the American Academy of Pediatrics released a policy statement entitled "Pediatricians and Public Health: Optimizing the Health and Well-Being of the Nation's Children". This statement is a call to action for those of us in leadership positions in medical education to ensure that we are practicing and teaching with the goal of integrating pediatrics and public health to improve the lives of all children.

This workshop is designed to be interactive, fun and informative. We will start with a brief review of the definition of public health and a discussion of the 10 essential public health services. This introduction will be followed by 3 case studies specifically designed to address one or two of the learning objectives. Using a small group interactive format, props and video examples, participants will increase the capacity of pediatricians at all levels of training to incorporate public health principles into medical education, clinical practice and community settings. In between each case study will be a brief break for a brief mindfulness exercise, a preparedness exercise that involves having 4 volunteers get 10 seconds to grab what they need from a shelf in the event of an evacuation and a teamwork exercise. There will be ample time for discussion and questions after concluding the case studies. A "What would you take if you have to evacuate?" exercise with preparedness bag distribution from Texas Department of Health and Human Services will provide a stimulating way to end the workshop, and will serve to inspire the participants to carry forth public health principles into their practice and daily lives.

TRANSFORMING YOUR PASSION INTO SCHOLARLY WORK

Workshop Leaders: Alexandria Caldwell and Marny Dunlap, *University of Oklahoma College of Medicine*

Target Audience: Trainees and faculty wanting to engage in research and other scholarly work that aligns with their passion.

Objectives:

- 1) Apply the process of transforming passion into scholarly work for participant projects.
- 2) Identify gaps in existing knowledge in the area of interest, and identify avenues for networking in the area of interest.

- 2) Identifying the Gaps in Existing Knowledge
- 3) Networking
- 4) Creating Goals and Objectives for their scholarly work.

Participants will have the opportunity for small group discussion and practice in implementing these steps. At the end of the workshop, participants will have created a plan to transform their passion into scholarly work.
